Intent

Our Art curriculum will stimulate creativity, imagination and individuality. We believe that art gives our pupils the skills, concepts and knowledge necessary for them to express responses to ideas and experiences. We will enable children to express themselves while they experience the beauty of colour, different mediums, light and materials. We will engage, inspire and challenge pupils, equipping them with the knowledge and skills to experiment, invent and create their own works of art, craft and design. We will fulfil the requirements of the National Curriculum for Art and Design by ensuring the progressive development of knowledge and skills, develop the children's competence in controlling materials and tools, fostering enjoyment and appreciation of the visual arts and developing their knowledge of significant artists, craftspeople and designers. This will enable children to become proficient in drawing, painting, sculpture and other art, craft and design techniques.

Drawing

Enjoy using graphic tools, fingers, hands, chalk, pens and pencils.

Use and begin to control a range of media.

Draw on different surfaces and coloured paper.

Produce lines of different thickness and tone using a pencil.

Start to produce different patterns and textures from observations, imagination and illustrations. Children begin to explore different techniques involved in drawing such as shading, thick and thin lines, patterns and shapes as well as using different surfaces to draw on. Children are also exposed to using different materials to draw with such as pencils, felt tips, charcoal, crayons, chalk and pastels.

Children can:

- draw lines of varying thickness;
- use dots and lines to demonstrate pattern and texture;
- use different materials for example pastels, chalk, felt tips;
- investigate tone by drawing light/dark lines, light/dark patterns, light/dark shapes using a pencil;
- understand tone through the use of different grades of pencils (HB, 2B, 4B);
- To begin to draw from observations.

Children develop their knowledge of drawing by continuing to use a variety of drawing tools from KS1. They are introduced to new ways of making effect through tone, texture, light and shadow.

They have the opportunity to use vocabulary learned in KS1 accurately, e.g. shading, thick and thin.

- experiment with showing line, tone and texture with different hardness of pencils;
- use shading to show light and shadow effects;
- use different materials to draw, e.g. pastels, chalk, felt tips;
- show an awareness of space when drawing;
- develop further drawings featuring the third dimension and perspective;
- attempt to show reflections in a drawing;
- To draw from observations.

Children continue to use a variety of drawing tools but are introduced to new techniques, e.g. creating perspective. They become more confident in techniques already learned and use the vocabulary learned accurately, e.g. shading, thick and thin. Children will rely on their sketching books to improve their drawing skills.
